Dr McDonald has trained hundreds of medical students and residents that have gone on to provide much needed healthcare to people in rural areas. He also trains two Obstetric Fellows per year in Obstetrics. These fellows go on to practice in rural communities.



Trendle Samuel RN, BSN, CLC

Trendle Samuel is a registered nurse and certified lactation counselor (CLC). She attended the University of Alabama where she received her Bachelor's degree in Nursing and she is currently pursuing a Master of Public Health there as well. After graduating, she worked as a maternal-child nurse for 16 years with 6 of those years in management of a Labor and Delivery unit. She then went to work at a Federally Qualified Health Center, working with uninsured and/or underserved patients. She now works for the Alabama Department of Public Health's State Perinatal Program where she is one of five Perinatal Coordinators in the state who examines infant, fetal and maternal mortality and works to create better outcomes for women, infants and families. She serves 12 counties in Perinatal Region II in West Alabama and is based in Tuscaloosa, AL.

Guillermo Godoy
